

Wednesday, August 4th, being the Anniversary of the Declaration of War, was observed as a special Day of Intercession. There was a congregation of about sixty at noon, when the service authorised for January 4th was used, and some sixty or seventy came to the darkened Church at 9 p.m. The service, which it is hoped to repeat on September 8th and once a month later, consisted of devotional music, prayers, short lesson, National Anthem sung kneeling, intercession by name for those serving, Grace, martial music.

In the afternoon the members of the Mothers' Union were entertained to tea, games, etc., by Mrs. Gostling, who has, to the great regret of

many friends, now given up her house and ceased to reside in Wye. After tea, Mrs. Lambert, on behalf of the members, presented Mrs. Gostling with a crushed morocco case for letters and photo frame, referring gratefully to her interest in the Mothers' Union, and her unfailing sympathy and many acts of kindness which had endeared her to Wye people. Mrs. Lambert has kindly consented to act as Secretary for the Mothers' Union in Mrs. Gostling's place.

August 11th. Two presentations were made to Miss Bonfield to-day—first in the Infants' School the Vicar was asked to hand to her a set of silver tea spoons, etc., and then in the Thornhill School a china tea service from the Band of Hope children. Miss Bonfield was quite "taken aback" by the gifts and kind sentiments expressed about her. The following is the letter she wrote subsequently:—

. "As it was impossible to thank individually the many friends and parents of the children who subscribed to the handsome presents (presented by the Vicar) before my departure from Wye, I feel I must, through the Magazine, tender my heartiest thanks to you all for the kind thought and appreciation of my work during the nine years I was amongst you. It was indeed a great surprise, and words cannot express what I felt when the presentation was made.

Though I am a good many miles away, my thoughts will often fly back to the children of Wye, whom I was very sorry to leave."

August 8th and 15th. Interesting sermons were preached at the morning service on these two Sundays by the Rev. F. O. Coop, Chaplain to the Forces, South Lancashire Division, and Vicar of St. Catherine's, Abercomby Square, Liverpool.

August 18th. Choir Trip. A party of eight adult members of the Choir, with the Vicar and Mr. Garrad, spent a very interesting day's outing at Folkestone and Dover. The weather was perfect, and the sea perfectly calm, so that an hour's run in a motor boat was enjoyed without interfering with anybody's digestion. One of our airships, like a great silver fish in the sky, was reconnoitring in the channel, torpedo destroyers and mine sweepers could be seen in the offing, and Canadian soldiers were making entrenchments; but otherwise the popular seaside resort was peaceful and affording healthful recreation to a good number of children, elder people and convalescent soldiers. After dinner at a restaurant in the town, we proceeded to Dover, and calling

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at the Missions to Seamen Institute were escorted by the Lay Reader, Mr. Hichens, on board a torpedo destroyer and a mine sweeper which had been under shell fire and suffered the loss of one man killed and two wounded. We were then welcomed at the Institute by Mrs. Bushell, who with her helpers, had provided a sumptuous tea, and after a walk about the harbour with all its war vessels coming and going, waterplanes, etc., we returned home feeling that our outing had been one of exceptional interest, and only regretting that all our friends had not been able to accompany us. Messrs. Tully and Slaughter and Mr. Harvey, who has so kindly taken Miss Martin's place during her month's holiday, were prevented by other engagements. At Ashford on the return journey a visit was paid to the Drill Hall in hopes of finding Private W. J. Ashby, but he was out on a night march.

August 24th. The Church was beautifully decorated with flowers for the marriage of Lieut. Christopher Bushell, of the Queen's Regiment, and Miss Rachel E. F. Lambert, the Canadian Vicar's elder daughter. diers who happened to be in Wye on manœuvres and were interested in the bridegroom as a wounded officer passed as fit to return to the front, and R.A.M.C. men billeted in Wye crowded also into Church and heartily cheered the happy pair on leaving. The ceremony was performed by the Rev. D. W. Hobson, M.A., Chaplain Superintendent of the Mersey Mission to Seamen, brother-in-law of the bridegroom: and the bride, dressed in simple white dress, with wreath of orange blossom and myrtle, was given away by her father. The Psalm 128 and hymns 578 and 520 were admirably led by the Choir. Mr. Harvey, officiating at the organ in Miss Martin's absence, played the Wedding March from Mendelssohn, and our company of bell-ringers rang out merry peals when the bride and bridegroom left the Church and when they went away about 2.30. Mr. and Mrs. Dunstan kindly threw open their garden for an informal reception after the service.

CHURCH COTTAGE CLUB.

This institution which, for twenty years past, has served a most useful and good purpose, has for some time been at a very low mark, and since last January, when it was let as a recreation room for the troops then stationed in Wye, has not been opened for the use for which it was originally designed, viz., a Village Club or Institute.

The matter has been a source of grave anxiety to the Committee which has met on several occasions faced with the prospect of being obliged to close. Finally, however, it has been decided to try and keep the Club going so that when its old members (many of whom have gone to serve their country) return, they may find a comfortable meeting-place where they will be able to renew old friendships, and enjoy once more that social intercourse which was so pleasurable to them in the by-gone days.

To carry out this very desirable object, support in different ways is urgently required, and as

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there will be monetary risks subscriptions will be acceptable and most gratefully received. But the best help is probably from regular membership, and therefore to all old members an earnest appeal is made to renew their acquaintance with the Club, and to try and bring new members in.

It is hoped that a re-opening will be made very shortly, and that various events may be arranged to keep up a lively interest in the institution.

BELGIAN REFUGEES.

A public meeting was held in the Church House on August 26th to receive the report of the Belgian Committee. The Treasurer stated that he had a balance in hand of £6; that the monthly receipts were roughly £18, and the monthly expenditure about the same amount. The number of Belgians supported by the subscribers was now only ten, and the expenditure had consequently been considerably curtailed; but unfortunately the number of subscribers had also fallen off very seriously during the last few months, so that the receipts barely met the expenditure.

These ten Belgians have to be supported entirely with food, clothing and houses, and the meeting was unable to suggest any way in which the cost, which only amounts to 9s. per head per week, could be reduced. With the winter coming on and the consequent increased cost of clothing, firing and lighting, the financial position is becoming a critical one, and if the number of subscribers continues to fall off the expenditure will very shortly exceed the receipts. If there are any new subscribers in Wye who would like to come forward and help to support our Belgian friends, who have now been exiled from their own homes for more than twelve months, they will be welcomed by the Committee. Those who have shouldered the burden so far have done well, and more than their share. One hundred and forty subscribers have contributed more than The original one hundred and forty are now reduced to seventy. Will not others come to the rescue?
